REVEREND MONSIGNOR ANSELM NWAORGU, Ph.D.

Msgr. Anselm Nwaorgu was born and raised in the Eastern part of Nigeria and immigrated to the United States in May of 1988 and was ordained to the priesthood in May 1992 for the Archdiocese of Newark, New Jersey. On May 30th, 2009, he became the first native African born priest in the United States Catholic Church to be elevated to the status of a Monsignor (Chaplain to His Holiness) by Pope Benedict XIV. Currently, he is the pastor of Blessed Sacrament St. Charles Borromeo Church, Newark, New Jersey, and the Administrator of the Igbo Catholic Community, Archdiocese of Newark, New Jersey. He was the First Executive President of the African Conference of Catholic Clergy and Religious in the United States and is presently, the consultant to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops on the Pastoral Care of African immigrants, in the Department of the Pastoral Care of Migrants, Refuges and travelers. He is also Grand Chaplain to the New York Grand Commandry of the Knights of St. John International and the Spiritual Director to the West Hudson and Essex Federation of the Holy Name Society in the Archdiocese of Newark.

Msgr. Anselm Nwaorgu has a bachelor's degree in philosophy, from Urban University, Rome; a master's degree in Systematic Theology; a master's degree in Counselor Prep; a Master's in Divinity in Pastoral Ministry, and a Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology, from Seton Hall University, South Orange, New Jersey. He is a licensed Psychologist in the State of New Jersey.

Msgr. Anselm has received a couple of awards for outstanding performances. In May 1991, he received the <u>Pope John Paul II Medal for Superior Academic Work in Theology</u> from Immaculate Conception Seminary, Seton Hall University, South Orange, New Jersey. In October 2008, he received a Citation Aware in <u>Recognition of Outstanding Religious Accomplishments and Dedicated Service to the Community</u> by the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc. Delta Pi Chapter; and in June of 2010, he received a <u>Commendation Award for Outstanding and Dedicated Service to the City of Newark</u> by The Newark Municipal Council, City of Newark, New Jersey.
